EDITORIAL.

PHESE are momentous years. Since the time when the Oldburian last appeared in 1938, violent, disruptive forces have revolutionised our mode of living. Change follows change, and, as time

passes by, a new age is dawning.

Years of war, with all its destruction and tragedy, and then years of peace, with almost superhuman tasks of reorganisation and rebuilding, have passed since the time when attention was last given to our school magazine. Innumerable duties, readily taken up by all of us, have left no time except for essentials.

Victory in the war was won only by stupendous sacrifices, and we record first our deepest sympathy to the relations of all our members who paid the supreme sacrifice or who otherwise suffered from the ravages of war. It is with profound regret that we have

to record the names of so many on our Roll of Honour.

Our duty now is to look ahead. All leaving the School year by year are vitally concerned about the future. In these historic days there is, and for many a year will be, the need for a generation of young men and women who will go out into the uncertainties of the world, equipped not only with ability and skill acquired by their training with us, but with enthusiasm and determination to stand firmly for Christian principles of living, on which alone civilisation can be firmly founded so that future welfare may be

Since our last issue, the School has benefited by the generosity of many kind friends. Dr. F. Eric Dawes, now a Governor of the School, has most generously founded the Dawes Memorial. University Scholarship in memory of his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dawes, both of whom always had our interests very much at heart, Mrs. Dawes in particular exerting a kindly and helpful influence on the School as a member of the Governing body for The School is indeed grateful to Dr. Dawes for many years. founding this scholarship. The interest from the trust fund will provide a substantial sum for one of our university entrants every year, the assistance normally extending over a period of three years

for each individual, so that three scholarships will always run concurrently. Prize Funds to encourage worthy leisure time activities have been established by both Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Barlow, and by Mr. A. P. Hands, while another fund has been founded by Dr. Dawes to preserve in perpetuity the custom of his parents in giving annual prizes for leadership. It has been decided, after consultation with Mr. Norman Quayle and Mr. C. T. Woodward, that the Quayle Memorial Fund, from which fees for certain pupils were paid in the past, will also be used in future for the provision of prizes. The school is indeed grateful to all the donors for these substantial additions to our endowments.

The changes affecting us by reason of the Education Act of 1944 and other related administrative measures are too numerous to mention. We must record, however, that the Borough of Oldbury is now an Excepted District under the Worcestershire Local Education Authority, and, as such, has been brought into close relationship with our School. The name, Oldbury County High School, has been replaced by the new name, Oldbury Grammar School, although the School is unchanged in status.

We extend our greetings to the Borough Council and its officials, particularly to Mr. J. H. C. Marsh, B.Sc., the Education Officer. We hope that recent changes will produce results beneficial to all concerned, and that, whatever the future may hold, we shall still go on progressively and increase our usefulness to the community of which we form a part, in accordance with our motto, "Cresco," to which we can justly claim to have been loyal.

IN MEMORIAM.

THE death of Major K. D. Hopkins on September 16th, 1942, while a prisoner of war in Germany, came as a blow to us all.

His teaching career began in 1920, when he joined our School. He was eminently successful as a teacher, and, in course of time, he added to his Degree of B.Sc., that of M.A. in Education.

In the summer of 1938, he was embodied in the Territorial Army, and saw active service in the early part of the war. During the retreat to Dunkirk, he, having commanded his men to move back, held a post alone, to cover them. This brave action resulted in his being taken prisoner by the Germans. Later, by reason of the rigours of life, he died while still a prisoner in their hands.

He will be remembered as a gallant soldier, a man of wide knowledge and understanding, an expert teacher and a loyal col-

SCHOOL WAR TIME ACTIVITIES.

URING war-time most of our out-of-school activities were designed to help the nation's war efforts. A National Savings Group was formed, a School Benevolent Fund for war and other charities was organised and registered, and sewing and knitting were undertaken for the Red Cross Society and the Forces.

SAVINGS.

The War Savings Group was formed in January, 1940, and has continued to the present day. Up to July, 1947, the total amount subscribed was £25,713 16s. 10d. Our outstanding effort was made in October, 1945, when £3,325 19s. 3d. was subscribed in Thanksgiving Week.

THE SCHOOL BENEVOLENT FUND

This Fund was raised by weekly collection in the School, concerts in School and public concerts by the Old Students and the Midland "Red" Musical Society, violin recitals by Louis Godowsky (accompanied by Dr. Howard), collections at Musical Festivals, and by Sales of Work done by pupils and friends of the School.

The total amount raised during the war was £2,781 14s. od.,

of which £2,039 15s. od. was raised by Sales of Work.

Books, games, cigarettes were sent to our own Old Students

who were prisoners of war.

Material was purchased, and pyjamas, nightshirts, pillowcases, nightdresses, bed jackets, etc., were made by the senior girls and mothers of pupils and sent to local hospitals (West Bromwich, Barnsley Hall, Sandfield, General Hospital, Birmingham), and to the Red Cross depot at Solihull and Worcester.

KNITTING GROUP.

In 1940 a Knitting Group was formed in the school to make comforts for the men in the three services. Parents and friends gave generous help and financial support, and a parcel was sent every term to each of the Forces.

In addition, the Group responded to the following special

appeals:-

Mrs. Churchill's call for mine-sweepers jerseys, Mrs. Cripp's appeal for oiled wool garments for Russia, Prisoners of War Comforts, and The Red Cross.

AGRICULTURAL CAMPS.

There were organised school camps in 1940, 1942, 1943 and 1944. The first three were on Mr. Stokes' fruit farm at Chadbury, Evesham, where we shared the work with Halesowen Grammar School and Stourbridge Grammar School in 1940, and with Halesowen Grammar School in 1942 and 1943. In 1944 we had our own camp at Avonbank, Pershore, and did farm work as well as fruit-picking. About ten masters and mistresses and seventy senior boys took part in each camp.

The excellent cooking of Mrs. Beresford, Mrs. Spencer and their helpers was a considerable factor in the general success.

SPEECH DAYS

WE are pleased to be able to report that in spite of war time difficulties our speech days were held annually and were, as usual, very interesting and enjoyable functions.

Dr. Howard each year was able to give a good report, showing that the School was not only growing in numbers but also living a happy corporate life: each successive year he was able to

GUIDES.

DURING the early war years Guide activities were somewhat curtailed, because of blackout, air raids and other difficulties, but despite these conditions, meetings were still held, although in the dinner hour.

In November, 1942, the Guides raised floo at a sale in order to buy rubber dinghies and life-saving apparatus for the Armed Forces.

It was a great thrill to be able to resume our after-school meetings, and an even greater thrill to be told in the year 1943 that we could go to camp. In August, we spent a very happy week in Chyknell Park, the home of The Honourable Mrs. Leigh, near the old-world village of Claverley. At the end of this camp, we all agreed that camping was the best holiday anyone could have.

On Saturday, September 8th, a Smethwick Youth Rally was held in Victoria Park. This was a very memorable occasion for all our Guides, because we saw for the first time our chief, Lady Baden-Powell.

In November an enrolment was held, also a sale. Captain took the enrolment and many proficiency badges were presented by the Deputy Mayoress, Mrs. Goode. The sale was very successful and a large sum of money was raised for camp funds—a just reward for our weeks of hard work.

On February 6, 1944, our company went to attend a Youth Rally at Worcester. We attended a service in the Cathedral, and were inspected by the County Commissioner, Mrs. Hill.

An interesting event during this year was the promotion of Dorothy Russell and Muriel Green to the rank of Lieutenant.

In the Spring and Summer, we took part in a District Guide Display, formed part of the procession for Salute the Soldier Week, won the cup in a sports competition between the Youth Movements of Oldbury, and we also attended various youth rallies and parades.

Camping time arrived again. This time the site chosen was Patshull Park. Unfortunately the week passed all too quickly,

and soon camp was but another pleasant memory.

In September, the Guides raised £15 by the sale of cakes, for the School Red Cross Fund, and then in November, another £30 at a Jumble Sale—this time for camp funds.

May, 1945, saw V.E. Day, and we attended a service of

thanksgiving in Oldbury Parish Church.

"Time flies." How true is this saying, for before we realised it we were off to camp again. This year we re-visited our camp site at Chyknell Park, and enjoyed ourselves even better than when we camped there previously.

We had a very busy week-end at the beginning of October, 1945. On October 6, we held a Jumble Sale at Oldbury Parish Rooms. Doors were opened at 2-30 p.m. and by 3 p.m. all the stalls were empty, and we had raised the amazing sum of £56. This exceeded our greatest expectations.—more camp funds.

Sunday, October 7, arrived at last. The day we had longed and waited for, for a long time—we, in company with other Guides of the district, went to Worcester to attend a Guide Rally, at which the Chief Guide was present. The rally took the form of a march past and salute taken by Lady Baden-Powell and a service at the Cathedral. After the service, on the Cathedral Green, we once more heard the well-known, well-beloved voice of our chief. She inspected us and the company was very thrilled when she shook hands with two of our Guides.

Other events of importance during the next few months were the parade in which we took part for Thanksgiving Week, and the parade for the Mayor's Sunday service at Oldbury Parish Church, and the Christmas Bazaar. At the Christmas Bazaar, on December 15, our company had a stall on which we sold Christmas cards which we had made ourselves. We soon sold out and were pleased to find we had made approximately £8.

Christmas Eve came and went, and in March, 1946, we were fortunate enough to have Dr. Dawes to give us a film show, which

was enjoyed by all.

On Tuesday, April 2, 1946, an enrolment was held, and we had the pleasure of having Mrs. A. Hill, the County Commissioner, to take it. Eleven recruits were enrolled as Guides, and

eleven Guides as Cadets, and many proficiency badges were awarded. After this, Mrs. Hill gave a very interesting talk on her visit to Europe. This was followed by various items by the Guides, and on this very happy and successful evening we ended

with a camp fire.

The inevitable examinations drew nearer, but with the exams. came the thoughts of camp, and these cheered us up and kept us going during the examinations. The thought of camp vas even more thrilling this year than it usually was, because for the first time since the war began, we were going to camp by the sea—and also, we were having a ten-day camp instead of the usual week.

We camped at Afflington Farm, near the quaint, picturesque little village of Corfe Castle. Everyone agreed that the more of camp you have, the more you want. But "all good things come to an end," even camp, and we went back home again "it as fiddles" and as "brown as berries." However, camp provided a very pleasant and amusing topic for our conversations for many

months afterwards.

Term began again, and as funds were rather low, it was decided to have a Christmas Bazaar to raise money. The next few months were spent in making useful and dainty presents. As Christmas drew nearer, the many attractive things began to pour in, and it was arranged that the Bazaar should be held early in December. Mrs. Barlow opened the sale for us, and the stalls began to look bare as the money rattled into the tins. Soon the stalls were emptied, and the exciting business of counting the money began. The grand total was announced as approximately £60—a very satisfactory ending to another happy year of Guiding.
